MALNUTRITION





Nigeria is home to the third largest population of malnourished children in the world, with an underfive mortality rate of 120 deaths per 1,000 live births, and an infant mortality rate of 70 per 1,000 live birth in 2017.

Interestingly, an essential component of health, which is Nutrition, over the years has been neglected. Adequate nutrition is critical during early childhood as they are important for organs, immune system and neurological development.

A total of N784.8 billion² was spent directly on health and social services in 2017 up from 2016 level of N745.58 billion while N2.636 trillion was spent by Nigerians on other health sensitive items



Historically, private health expenditure accounted for approximately 78 percent of Nigeria's health expenditure.



The out of pocket segment account for approximately 70 percent of total health expenditure or 90 percent of total private health expenditure.



The Federal government account for approximately 10% of health related spending in Nigeria while the state and local government health expenditure was approximately 8% and 4% respectively.




The Problem Wasting




Severe Wasting





2018 Federal Government Approved Budget











Breakdown - Nutrition Specific Intervention











Breakdown - Nutrition Sensitive Intervention




Direct budgetary allocation to improve food security in 2018 stands at N266.75m up from 2017 level of N88.5m. Allocations dedicated mainly to mothers and young children health - through changes in income, and increased availability and accessibility of diverse nutrient-dense foods in 2014 and 2015 was N90m and N64.6m respectively.




Kaduna State Government Budgetary Allocation





Kano State Government Budgetary Allocation





Niger State Government Budgetary Allocation






Lagos State Government Budgetary Allocation




